## HOUSING

The **workshops for mentors** are designed to deepen their understanding of the housing issues migrants face and to equip them with tools and strategies to support young migrants in securing and maintaining stable housing. ## WORKSHOPS FOR MENTORS

### Legal Framework and Access to Housing

**Goal:** To train mentors in understanding the basic legal aspects of housing policy and access to housing for young migrants, enabling them to support their mentees in understanding the legal requirements and processes for securing safe accommodation.

**Duration:** 3 hours

**Materials Needed:** Legal handbooks, case study materials, list of local housing support resources

### Workshop Structure:

1. **Introduction:** A brief overview of migrants' housing rights in Slovenia, with an emphasis on access to housing and special provisions for migrants.
2. **Identifying Barriers:** Discussion in which mentors identify common obstacles young migrants face in accessing housing.

**Competences Gained:** Understanding of the legal framework, identifying and managing specific barriers, familiarity with available resources for support.



### **Developing Life Skills for Independent Living**

**Goal:** To equip mentors with the knowledge necessary to support young migrants in developing practical skills such as finding and renting appropriate housing, communicating with landlords, financial planning, and managing daily life.

**Duration:** 4 hours

**Materials Needed:** List of basic skills for independent living, sample budget, housing search guide, financial planning resources

#### **Workshop Structure:**

1. **Identifying Needs:** Mentors analyze key skills that migrants need for successful integration, including basic life skills, financial literacy, and knowledge of housing regulations.
2. **Financial Planning:** Mentors explore practical examples of how to help mentees plan monthly expenses, including rent, bills, savings, and handling unexpected costs.
3. **Rental Simulation:** Mentors simulate the process of renting a property, taking on the roles of landlord and tenant to understand key considerations for migrants in negotiating and understanding rental agreements.
4. **Managing Accommodation:** Mentors develop strategies to help young people maintain their accommodation and communicate with landlords when issues or repairs arise.
5. **Closing Reflection:** Group feedback and sharing of advice on how best to support migrants in building self-sufficiency and responsibility regarding housing.

**Competences Gained:** Financial planning, understanding rental procedures, support in maintaining housing.

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### **Building a Safe and Inclusive Community**

**Goal:** To equip mentors with strategies for helping young migrants create social networks in their new environment, with a focus on community support, engagement in local society, and finding safe accommodation.

**Duration:** 3 hours

**Materials Needed:** List of local organizations, community living guide, interactive map highlighting support for migrants

#### **Workshop Structure:**

1. **Identifying Local Resources:** Mentors get to know organizations that offer support to migrants in housing, employment, and social connections.
2. **Building Social Networks:** Discussion on the importance of social networks for obtaining information about safe accommodation. Mentors explore how to help migrants find groups that foster connection and support.

## WORKSHOPS FOR YOUNG MIGRANTS

**Duration:** 3 hours

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### **Building a Supportive Network in Your New Community**

**Duration:** 3 hours

The **health and well-being workshops** empower mentors with knowledge of healthcare systems and mental health resources, enabling them to support young migrants through health-related challenges. Young migrants learn essential skills in health literacy, self-care, and effective communication with healthcare providers, enhancing their access to healthcare and promoting mental resilience. This focus on both physical and mental health equips young migrants to lead healthier, more balanced lives in their new community.

In the **legal status and rights workshops**, mentors gain an understanding of migrants' legal rights and processes, enabling them to support young migrants in navigating complex legal systems. Young migrants develop self-advocacy skills and confidence in managing their legal requirements, allowing them to exercise their rights effectively. This legal knowledge empowers them to make informed decisions, fostering independence and resilience in their interactions with institutions.

The **integration policies workshops** help mentors foster cultural exchange and community engagement, equipping them with strategies to encourage young migrants' participation in local activities. Young migrants are empowered to actively engage in community life, building connections and mutual understanding with host community members. By celebrating their cultural identity and engaging in cross-cultural communication, they contribute to a welcoming, cohesive community.

Overall, these workshops create a supportive structure that benefits both mentors and young migrants, promoting independence, social cohesion, and a sense of belonging. They lay a strong foundation for young migrants to thrive, feel valued, and fully participate in their new environment, while mentors are empowered to advocate and guide them effectively. Together, these workshops strengthen community integration and support the successful adaptation of young migrants.



## CHALLENGES WHEN WORKING WITH MIGRANTS

When working with migrants, especially in the context of workshops focused on housing, health, legal rights, and integration, several challenges and potential pitfalls may arise. Understanding and anticipating these issues can help ensure that workshops are inclusive, supportive, and effective.

One key challenge is the **language barrier**, which can hinder communication and lead to misunderstandings about critical information on housing rights, healthcare access, or legal processes. Even with translation support, complex legal or health terminology can be difficult to convey accurately, potentially leaving migrants feeling uncertain or uninformed. Additionally, mentors may struggle to explain nuanced cultural or institutional differences, which can create confusion about expectations or responsibilities.

**Building trust** is another critical issue. Many migrants have experienced trauma, displacement, or discrimination, which may make them hesitant to engage fully or trust authority figures, even in a supportive environment. This lack of trust can make it difficult for mentors to establish open communication or for young migrants to share personal challenges they face in housing or health settings. Patience, cultural sensitivity, and creating a safe space are essential to overcoming this barrier, but these efforts may take time and sustained commitment.

Migrants may also face **bureaucratic and logistical hurdles** that complicate the practical application of workshop content. For example, securing housing or healthcare can involve complex paperwork and waiting periods, which can be daunting for those unfamiliar with the local systems. Even after learning about their legal rights, migrants may find it challenging to assert them, particularly if they fear retaliation from landlords or employers. Mentors may also encounter difficulties when trying to refer mentees to resources, as access to services can be inconsistent or limited based on legal status.



Another potential pitfall is **cultural misunderstandings** that can occur in both directions. Migrants may come from societies with different expectations around housing, healthcare, or legal processes, and mentors may unintentionally impose assumptions from their own cultural perspectives. This cultural disconnect can lead to frustration or resistance, especially if migrants feel that their own values or practices are being dismissed or misunderstood. Integrating cultural sensitivity into workshops is essential, but it requires ongoing self-awareness and adaptability from mentors.

Lastly, **overwhelming information** is a potential pitfall, especially given the broad topics covered in these workshops. Migrants may feel overloaded with complex information on housing rights, healthcare options, and legal obligations, leading to confusion or disengagement. Simplifying content, providing clear takeaways, and offering follow-up support can help, but it's essential to recognize that even with support, adapting to a new system takes time and may not happen smoothly.

In sum, working with migrants in these contexts requires patience, adaptability, and cultural sensitivity. Acknowledging these challenges and potential pitfalls can help mentors and workshop facilitators create a more inclusive, understanding, and ultimately effective learning environment that supports young migrants in their journey toward stability and integration.

## WHAT CAN GO WRONG

When implementing workshops for young migrants on housing, healthcare, legal rights, and integration, several issues can arise that may undermine the program's effectiveness. Recognizing these potential pitfalls can help facilitators plan for and mitigate problems, creating a smoother and more impactful experience for participants.

One common issue is insufficient cultural sensitivity or adaptability. If facilitators don't fully understand or respect the diverse cultural backgrounds of young migrants, misunderstandings or discomfort may arise. For instance, certain methods or topics, like mental health discussions or financial independence, may not align with some participants' cultural norms or values. This can lead to disengagement or even mistrust among participants if they feel their backgrounds and perspectives are not respected.

Lack of adequate language support is another critical pitfall. If workshops are conducted in a language not fully understood by all participants, or if complex terminology is not simplified, migrants may struggle to grasp essential information. This can result in confusion, misinterpretation of rights and responsibilities, and diminished confidence in applying what they've learned. Providing multilingual materials, translators, or simplified explanations is essential for successful communication.

Overloading participants with information is also a risk. The topics covered in these workshops—legal frameworks, healthcare rights, financial planning, and self-advocacy—are complex and potentially overwhelming. If too much content is delivered in a short time without breaks or opportunities for discussion, participants may feel overwhelmed, leading to disengagement and lower retention of crucial information.

Inadequate logistical planning can also cause problems. Young migrants often have competing priorities, such as work, family obligations, or fluctuating schedules, which may make regular attendance challenging. Without flexible scheduling, remote options, or resources for those who miss sessions, attendance and engagement may suffer. Practical planning, such as offering childcare during sessions or reimbursing travel expenses, can make these workshops more accessible.

Additionally, insufficient follow-up and support can reduce the long-term impact of the workshops. Migrants may leave the sessions with a basic understanding but struggle to apply what they've learned in real-life situations. Without ongoing support or clear paths to additional resources, they may face obstacles that deter them from exercising their new knowledge or skills.

Resource limitations, such as lack of funding for materials, skilled facilitators, or technical support, can also jeopardize the program's success. If workshops are under-resourced, they may lack the depth and quality needed to provide meaningful, lasting benefits to participants.

Lastly, overly rigid expectations about integration may alienate participants. Some young migrants may be hesitant to immediately immerse themselves in community activities or unfamiliar cultural settings. Pushing too quickly for integration without accommodating individual comfort levels can lead to resistance and limit the program's effectiveness.

To address these challenges, a well-planned approach that emphasizes cultural sensitivity, accessibility, realistic pacing, and ongoing support is essential. By anticipating these potential pitfalls, facilitators can implement workshops that are inclusive, effective, and responsive to the unique needs of young migrants.



## FEEDBACK

### POVOD, ZAVOD ZA KULTURO IN RAZVOJ MEDNARODNIH ODNOSOV V KULTURI (Slovenia)

*"The workshops provided critical insights into local integration challenges and were highly relevant for both mentors and migrants in Slovenia."*

**Positive:** Participants from POVOD appreciated the workshop's focus on practical solutions for integration, especially the modules that addressed Slovenia-specific challenges, such as navigating legal requirements and understanding local housing policies. The emphasis on fostering open dialogue and mutual respect was seen as very beneficial for mentors, as it equipped them with the skills to handle sensitive issues and support young migrants in adapting to the Slovenian community. The cultural exchange sessions were particularly valued, as they encouraged active participation and promoted cultural understanding in ways that align well with Slovenia's community-focused approach to integration.

**Negative:** While participants found the content highly relevant, they suggested that more ongoing support for mentors would be beneficial, particularly through follow-up workshops or regular check-ins to reinforce learning. Some also mentioned that additional case studies featuring experiences specific to Slovenia could enhance the relevance of the content, as this would provide more immediate, real-world examples for mentors to draw upon.

### IASIS (Greece)

*"The workshops offered valuable insights, especially in addressing complex cultural challenges that arise in integration efforts."*

**Positive:** The participants praised the workshops for emphasizing empathy, understanding, and effective communication skills that are vital when working with migrant populations in Greece. They particularly valued the sessions that delved into cultural sensitivity, as this helped both mentors and migrants gain a deeper understanding of one another. The focus on practical skills, such as conflict resolution and cultural exchange activities, was instrumental in fostering a supportive and inclusive environment.

**Negative:** Participants expressed that while the overall content was insightful, including more Greece-specific examples—such as case studies or local integration policies—could have made the material feel even more relevant. The organization suggested tailoring some elements of the training to address the specific challenges faced by young migrants in Greece, such as language barriers or unique legal obstacles they encounter.

## PRISMS (Malta)

*"We valued the practical focus on creating safe, inclusive spaces for cultural exchange, which is so relevant to our local setting."*

**Positive:** PRISMS participants appreciated the workshop's practical orientation, which provided tangible strategies for fostering inclusivity and cultural understanding. The exercises on building trust and active listening were especially well-received, as they gave mentors actionable skills to support young migrants in feeling comfortable and engaged within the community. The sessions on community-building activities, like collaborative projects and cultural storytelling, resonated strongly as they aligned well with PRISMS' focus on community integration.

**Negative:** Some participants felt that while the training was comprehensive, it could benefit from further customization for Malta's local context. Specific resources, such as Maltese legal guidance or examples from the local migrant community, would provide added value. They also suggested adding scenarios related to Malta's social and cultural landscape to help participants visualize the application of workshop lessons in real-world situations.



## FUNDACJA EUROPEJSKI INSTYTUT OUTSOURCINGU (Poland)

"The focus on resilience and empowerment gave our participants confidence in addressing integration challenges head-on."

**Positive:** This organization highlighted how empowering the workshops were, particularly in building resilience among young migrants. Mentors felt well-equipped to support migrants in overcoming obstacles, thanks to sessions focused on self-advocacy, resilience-building, and personal empowerment. These aspects were especially valuable for mentors working with young people facing legal and social barriers in Poland, as they provided a solid foundation for fostering independence and self-reliance.

**Negative:** Participants noted that while the workshops covered essential material, the sessions could feel intensive, especially during the longer modules. A more interactive and varied approach, with breaks and additional group discussions, could enhance engagement. Suggestions were also made to incorporate local experts or case studies from Polish communities to bring a localized perspective to the resilience-building sessions.

## DENEYIMSEL EGITIM MERKEZI DERNEGI (Turkey)

*"The practical application of bias recognition tools was invaluable, helping us address cultural misunderstandings proactively."*

**Positive:** The organization found the bias recognition and management techniques incredibly helpful, particularly in understanding and mitigating cultural misunderstandings. These skills have proven essential in Turkey's multicultural communities, where biases and cultural preconceptions can complicate integration. Role-playing exercises and real-life case studies were highlighted as beneficial, giving mentors practical methods to address biases constructively with young migrants.

**Negative:** However, participants expressed the need for additional support with the digital tools used during the sessions, as some found it challenging to navigate the technology. More introductory training on using these tools could help mentors feel more comfortable, ensuring that they can fully participate in all aspects of the workshop.

## Kogemuskeskus MTÜ (Estonia)

*"We particularly benefited from the cultural exchange activities, which fostered a more welcoming environment for young migrants."*

**Positive:** The cultural exchange activities received very positive feedback from participants in Estonia, where fostering connections between migrants and locals is a priority. Activities such

as storytelling and sharing cultural traditions allowed young migrants to feel seen and valued. These sessions promoted inclusivity and mutual respect, helping mentors to understand how small actions can make a significant difference in creating a welcoming atmosphere.

**Negative:** While effective overall, participants suggested that expanding the range of conflict scenarios and discussions could help address more specific cultural and social differences in Estonia. Having more varied examples, perhaps based on real situations faced by local migrants, would help mentors feel better prepared for the diverse challenges they may encounter.

## ASSOCIATION INTERCULTURA (France)

*"Our participants enjoyed the balance of theory and practice, particularly in the use of non-verbal communication."*

**Positive:** Mentors and young migrants from Association Intercultura praised the workshops for balancing theoretical knowledge with practical exercises. The sessions on non-verbal communication were especially beneficial, as they underscored the importance of cultural sensitivity and reading body language to build trust. Participants felt that they gained valuable tools for engaging with migrants in a way that transcends language barriers and promotes understanding.

**Negative:** Some participants suggested that more frequent workshops would be helpful to reinforce learning and allow for ongoing skill development. They also recommended periodic follow-up sessions to address emerging integration challenges and allow participants to share their experiences and solutions with one another.



## Crossing Borders (Denmark)

*"The focus on advocating for cultural understanding was impactful and will strengthen our community ties."*

**Positive:** Crossing Borders valued the workshop's emphasis on advocacy and cultural understanding, especially the modules on teaching mentors how to facilitate cultural dialogues. These skills are crucial for Denmark's integration initiatives, as they foster respect and appreciation across diverse groups. The advocacy tools provided were seen as empowering, giving mentors the ability to promote inclusive practices effectively within their communities.

**Negative:** Participants noted a need for follow-up support after the workshop to help them implement the strategies learned in their daily interactions with migrants. Some recommended that additional resources, such as access to a facilitator or periodic coaching, would be helpful in applying these concepts long-term.

## Lélektér Alapítvány (Hungary)

*"Workshops were instrumental in fostering an understanding of mental health support for migrants, a crucial topic for integration."*

**Positive:** The mental health support modules were particularly appreciated by Lélektér Alapítvány, where understanding and addressing mental health needs in migrant communities is increasingly important. Participants felt that the workshops provided practical resources for supporting young migrants' emotional and psychological well-being, which is often neglected in integration programs. The focus on self-care and resilience-building was seen as crucial in fostering a sense of safety and belonging.

**Negative:** However, some participants recommended a greater focus on local mental health resources that could provide immediate support in Hungarian communities. By incorporating more region-specific mental health guidance and partnerships with local services, they felt that the workshops could be even more effective.



## ASSOCIACAO INTERCULTURAL PARA TODOS (Portugal)

*"The collaborative exercises gave participants confidence and practical strategies for fostering inclusion."*

**Positive:** Participants from Associacao Intercultural Para Todos appreciated the collaborative nature of the workshops, which encouraged teamwork and social cohesion. The group activities, especially those focused on building connections and understanding, were seen as essential in fostering inclusion within local communities. These exercises also helped participants feel empowered to continue promoting inclusivity through social interactions and community projects.

**Negative:** A few participants felt that the workshop content could be more tailored to Portugal's specific social and cultural context. Including more localized examples and case studies could help mentors relate the material directly to situations they might encounter, thereby increasing the relevance of the training.



## Mali Musow ODV (Italy)

*"The strategies for addressing stereotypes were effective, yet more Italian-centered examples could improve application."*

**Positive:** The workshop's approach to understanding and addressing stereotypes was highly valued, particularly the exercises that encouraged self-reflection and empathy. Mentors felt that the techniques provided were useful for breaking down misconceptions and fostering a positive, inclusive environment for young migrants in Italy. They appreciated the mix of activities that encouraged active engagement and constructive dialogue.

**Negative:** Participants noted that while the strategies were valuable, the workshop could be further improved with more Italian-specific examples, making it easier for mentors to apply the strategies directly within their communities. This adjustment could help bridge the gap between theory and real-world practice, making the workshops even more impactful for local needs.

Overall, each organization appreciated the workshops' emphasis on practical, inclusive strategies and suggested adjustments to tailor the content further to local needs, ensuring relevance and effective application in their respective contexts.



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
